Once again, I am absolutely delighted to see the positive stories from all our academies. I visit each academy often and continue to be delighted with the conduct of our 5,000 students and 500 staff. Nothing means more to me than to see our staff being positive

and optimistic with the students and with each other. We must make sure everyone is feeling motivated and ready to learn and teach. This approach is at the very heart of The Priory Learning Trust (TPLT).

On October 1st The King Alfred School in Highbridge became the third secondary academy to join TPLT. We now refer to them as TKASA. Nathan Jenkins is the forward-thinking Principal at our academy here in Somerset.

We have started the £1.2million re-roofing project at TKASA and all is going very well. So, TKASA is starting to look, and feel like a TPLT academy with a much-improved site. We are also working hard on improving the approach to teaching and leadership. Welcome.

The Trust, therefore, continues to grow wisely. We are happily strong with our finances and outcomes. Some of you may have watched the recent BBC 2 documentary called 'School'? The Trust involved in these programmes painted a picture we do not completely recognise. This may be because we have built, over many years at PCSA, and now TPLT, a team of very financially astute business staff. Of course, we'd all like more funding to go into education, however, the main 'income stream' is the number of students; I'm delighted to say that PCSA is 57 over number on first choices for September 2019 entry and WCSA is up 17% on last year's first choices. So, we hope that both our WSM secondary academies will be at 300 students in Year 7 in 2019 and onwards. Both our primary academies at St Anne's and Castle Batch remain very, very popular with parents / carers.

Charity is very important to us in our Trust. The recent non-uniform day raised over £4K across our academies. This was split between Children in Need and Weston Hospicecare. All other charity events this year will donate to WHC. Many staff, and we hope students, will be taking part in The Mendip Challenge for WHC next summer. A long walk for a great cause.

"My parents are great and Worle Community School have been so supportive. This school is amazing and a great community and settled me in so well. They have offered me their recording studio." Jill Remembered 20 years on as thousands of children embrace good news worldwide project

The legacy of a humble and brilliant Worle journalist lives on 20 years after her death with students across the world gathering good news in her name.

Former Worle student Jill Dando died 20 years ago this April evoking national shock similar to that of the 'People's Princess' Lady Diana two years before.

The PLT students are now aiming to start an annual World Goodnews Day on 26th April 2019 - 20 years after her death. The Goodnews Day will aim to encourage students and Media across the world to find and cover positive stories and ones that feature good out of bad.

Jill was the 'girl next door' and queen of prime time TV, loved by millions and won BBC Personality of the Year in 1997, before being tragically killed in 1999.

She was kind, generous and compassionate - everything which the nearly 5000 students in The Priory Learning Trust students aspire to be.

WCSA Principal Jacqui Scott said: "It is such a wonderful thing to see so many students carrying on finding good news in Jill's name."

Jill's brother Nigel said: "This scheme is brilliant. It is about children getting good news across the world."


